SUMMER SERMON SERIES

"The Gospel According To David in the Psalms"

From Pastor Chad

The life of David is one of the great sagas from the Biblical narrative. For many of us, our familiarity with David's story probably began at a young age, perhaps coloring a handout in Sunday School of the young shepherd, king to be, standing before Goliath with his loaded sling in hand and the pouch at his side holding four additional, and as it turned out, unnecessary stones. We know him to have been God's chosen king of Israel, the one from whose line Jesus would eventually come. The Psalms are also familiar to many of us. They are the place to which we frequently turn to give expression - sometimes in corporate song, other

times in private reflection - to our prayers of praise and our cries of lament before the Lord.

In this summer sermon series, we will be wedding the two by looking at the Gospel according to David through the lens of some of his own psalms*. There are fourteen psalms of David with headings that specifically reference incidents in his life. We will look at twelve of them in our series. The psalms themselves do not make reference to the specific events in most cases, other than the information shared in the titles. In that sense they are not historical accounts told in poetic narrative. Rather, they are an expression of "David meditating on, and drawing out the lessons from, his experiences, telling the 'story within the story', the feelings behind the facts, the way faith came to the rescue, prayer was made and heard, and above all, the glory of the Lord in power and mercy. They are David's 'real' account of his story..." (Alec Motyer). They are the

spiritual and emotional memoirs of David, a man after God's own heart, and they ultimately point us to his descendant, the Messiah; to his Lord and Savior, Jesus.

As we embark on this sermon series the hope is that while studying the Gospel According to David in the Psalms we will see that there is a connection between our daily lives and the spiritual reality of our faith in Christ. The two are not separate things. Rather God is actively working in and through us, and the events and people around us, by His Spirit to accomplish His will, to glorify the name of Christ, and to work good for those who love Him. ■

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

May 2018

The elders of First Presbyterian Church meet monthly on the fourth Tuesday. The following are some highlights from the May meeting.

- The Session and Diaconate have both been reading and discussing the book, *The Hole in Our Holiness*, by Kevin DeYoung, at their monthly meetings in 2018. This month we read and discussed chapter 4, "The Impetus for Imperatives". Particular attention was given to discussing the concepts of delighting in the law of the LORD (Psalm 119:41-48) and living out the law of love toward God and others (Matthew 22:36-40).
- •Stewardship and Finance reported that as of the end of April tithes and offering toward the church's general budget are at 37.56% of the annual budget. This is ahead of the average of 29.15% (2013-2017) our church has historically received by the end of April. Praise was given to God in prayer for His financial blessing.

Daniel Hunt will be the elder available for prayer in Mackay's office on Sunday mornings in June following the morning worship service.

- The chairmen of the committees of the Session gave reports of the work and ministry they are overseeing. Prayer was offered after each report, asking for the Lord's guidance and blessing.

- •A season of prayer was had for various needs within our congregation and community.

DILIGENT DOWNTIME

From Pastor Mackay

In life and in church-life, summer is a time when things slow down. Temperatures rise, school wraps up, and we all hear the clarion call of a beach chair or a mountain porch telling us to take it easy. Here at First Presbyterian, our midweek Ekklesia program goes on hiatus,

easy. Here at First Presbyterian, our m week Ekklesia program goes on hiatus and some pews empty as our beloved seasonal folks make their way north.

This particular rhythm of the year is a wonderful reminder that God has created us as people who need rest. In fact, God loves us so much, He created the world with a seven day rhythm, one day being set aside specifically for worshipful rest! (Mark 2:27) The idea that we can drive on in our work and home lives without rest is foolish.

So, rest isn't bad; it's beneficial and necessary for our thriving as Christians. Yet seasons like summer can skew our perspective. While we are people who need rest, rest is not our ultimate goal in this life. We are called to run the race with endurance as we look forward to eternity with God in Christ (Heb. 12:1-2). If you've ever done a little too much couch-surfing for a few months, you know that too much rest (a sinful idolatry of rest) doesn't match up with building much endurance!

So, how to avoid spiritual slothfulness? How can we rest well during this season of the year? First, understand that rest is meant to refresh and prepare you for work. The six-and-one rhythm of the week inherently tells us that. We are made to be fruitful in service to God and our fellow man. We are not made to be pleasure-seeking lumps. (Prov. 6:6-11; Rom. 12:11) So, we don't do our work for the goal of Netflix and pizza; we slow down and have an evening of entertainment so our minds and bodies can be rested and energized for the work that lies ahead.

Next, keep regularly in the means of grace (worship, prayer, and sacrament). Summer ...continues on page 5

It all sounds innocent enough, but next thing you know, you will have developed life habits that don't include any spiritual growth patterns. So, be sure your Bible goes with you to the beach (and doesn't stay in


the suitcase). If you're gone over a weekend, find a local congregation with which to worship.

Finally, remember that a great, eternal rest awaits in Jesus. Our labors on earth are just that: labors. Sin weighs us down and following the Lord is often not easy. Yet, our labors will end, and that very soon. Striving forward in our pursuit of Christ now shows that we ultimately value not selfindulgent, cheap rest, but the perfect rest of Heaven and the New Heavens and New Earth. Jesus has borne the burden that we could not bear, the burden of our sin, and his perfect rest in Heaven is shared by all those who trust in him. (Matt. 11:30)

Have you ever been annoyed after a vacation? It promised so much, yet delivered so little. A vacation can't provide what your soul really needs. Jesus can; He gives you himself. May we remember that this summer and throughout the year as we diligently seek him.



THE AMERICAN RED CROSS COMMUNITY SPIRIT AWARD

On Wednesday night, May 23, Mr. Steve Thompson, Disaster Program Manager with the American Red Cross of Mid-Florida, presented us, the First Presbyterian Church, with the Community Spirit Award for 2018. According to Mr. Thompson,

> The American Red Cross Community Spirit Award is designed to provide recognition to individuals, groups or organizations who have made a significant humanitarian contribution to the local community in support of the American Red



Cross. The First Presbyterian Church of Lake Wales has been a shelter partner of the American Red Cross since 2004 and has always opened its doors to the Red Cross during disasters. With no prior notice in 2017, both in February and again in April, the

Church made itself available during the evacuation of Indian Lake Estates from wildfires that affected 700 homes. The First Presbyterian Church of Lake Wales showed true community spirit during a time of need, and the American Red Cross of Mid-Florida is pleased to confer this award in recognition of the Church's generous service.

Since partnering with the Red Cross as an emergency shelter, First Presbyterian has been activated on several occasions as a result of weather events and other occasions where temporary housing was needed, or when it was thought a need was imminent. We continue to open our doors in these emergency situations to those in need.

GROWING ROOTS

The beginning of the position of Youth Director almost five months ago started just like any other position. Everything had that "new job" feel. I was excited, nervous, wanting to convey an air of confidence, yet deep inside I understood that I was still getting a hang of the ministry, still learning, taking things in. That being said, coming into this position I had some notion of what I wanted the ministry to be, but as each month passed I came to more of a realization of what real Biblical ministry to our students would look like at First Pres.

In my beginning months, I found that a huge temptation in youth ministry is the desire to be attractional. Often, you will hear of a lot of youth ministers expressing the fact that youth ministry is treated and evaluated like a consumer product. It is expected that students should have an experience in which they are awed and wowed, that the youth ministry should be fun, delightful, entertaining, and appealing. While I certainly did want our students to have a good time during youth group, this quarter I was really challenged by some words of Paul.

As I was teaching Galatians this semester, I came across chapter 1, verse 10. In this passage, Paul says, "Am I now trying to win the approval of human beings, or of God? Or am I trying to please people? If I were still trying to please people, I would not be a servant of Christ." This passage prompted serious questions on my part: what was to be the aim of this ministry? Is the focus of the youth ministry to get the students to like me? Was our big priority to bring these students to a place where they enjoyed this ministry? Paul seemed to think that if his sole interest was simply to satisfy the interests of others, he would be doing a disservice not only to the Galatians, but also (and most significantly) to Christ. If ministry is to be Christ honoring, then, it must be more than gratifying a consumer interest.

This idea is intensified even more when considering a major national study on youth and

religion headed by a sociologist named Christian Smith. According to this study, when interviewing 3,000 young people, it was found that while many of those interviewed identified as Christian, only a small percentage could actually articulate the major tenants of the gospel. Their belief system consisted of a God who acted as a divine therapist/waiting service. Furthermore, it was believed by these teenagers that this God is not really active in our day-to-day lives, so it is up to us to try to be good, moral people. If this is the present reality for our teenagers, what could be missing in the Church's ministry to it's youth? In other words, while having an entertaining hour with the students certainly isn't a bad thing, there must be more at stake when it comes to youth ministry.

Continuing on, as I persisted in my studies of Galatians, I became more and more convicted as to what the students needed. There is a gripping part in Galatians where Paul seems as if he is in agony over the people in these churches. He has an intense desire for them to believe the gospel, to love Jesus, to give their whole lives over to glorifying and enjoying their Maker. Paul expresses this desire in chapter 4, verse 19, when he says: "...I am again in the anguish of childbirth until Christ is formed in you!" Again, witnessing Paul's heart was convicting. Was this my desire? More than I want people to like me or this ministry, was my goal for Christ to be formed in the lives of these students?

Coming up on month five of this ministry, I am praying that it's purpose continues to reflect Paul's passion here in Galatians. As we've wrestled with not only the goal of this ministry, but also the format of it as well, I am encouraged to see how far we've come. A big component has been small groups. Finishing out this year, students will be connected in weekly small groups that meet in the church building as well as in homes. While I am teaching them every week, I am also excited about the fact that students are being connected to small group leaders who are also passionate about forming Christ in them. As I've been teaching through Galatians, the students have been looking through the Bible themselves, personally interacting with the text. While this sounds simple, this is the Great Commission the Lord left for us, the means to creating a gospel-centered culture of community. And while we are certainly having fun with things like open gyms and pick ups, I am looking forward to where God is taking us as we are (I think) strategically posed to tackle the goal of forming Christ in our students this upcoming school year.
