STEWARDSHIP

From Pastor Chad

From the very beginning of time, humans, being created in the image of God, have been called as stewards over God's domain. Recall the Lord's words to Adam and Eve, and through them to us, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth," (Genesis 1:28). This is the call of a master to His stewards, to oversee His domain to the glory of His name. The Fall has made that calling impossible for us in and of ourselves, as not only do we in our sin manage the Lord's "estate" poorly, too often bringing thorns and thistles from the ground instead of fruit, but we also see any success we do have as a glory to ourselves rather than to God.

What then are we to do? If in our sin we are miserable servants, deserving of the Master's displeasure and judgment, then where is our hope? Better yet, in whom is our hope and in whom can we find the wisdom, strength, and desire to rightly serve our great and glorious Master? The answer of course is Jesus Christ. As the Son of God incarnate He has become what Adam failed to be. He has become the godly steward over God's domain who served the Lord in perfect obedience, never looking for His own glory apart from that of His Father but only ever serving and stewarding in such a way that God's kingdom would be fruitful and prosperous, multiplying in the hearts and souls of His many sons and daughters from every tribe and nation and tongue.

The epitome of Christ's stewardship is seen on the cross where He willingly and obediently laid down His life in order to see it taken up on the third day, raised in glory. It would have been a gain in and of itself had His own resurrection been all the fruit that Christ's death yielded. But it isn't. His death led not only to His own glorious resurrection but to the resurrection of all who have been given to Him. He has not lost one of those whom the Father has entrusted to Him. Christ is the firstfruits, the firstborn from among the dead. Where Adam failed and led all of humanity into sin and death, Christ has

succeeded and led the elect into life and righteousness (1 Corinthians 15:20-23). Christ's sacrificial stewardship of His very life on our behalf has made it such that we who are in Him can steward our time, talents, treasures, our very lives even, to the glory of God the Father.

Each of us has been given different roles to play and different gifts to steward, depending on *God's varied grace* as we serve one another to His glory (1 Peter 4:10-11). Are you serving His Church to the glory of His name by being a godly steward of your Spiritual gifts (Romans 12:3-8; 1 Corinthians 12-14)? Of your natural talents? Of your time? Of your treasures (financial resources)? Let us, as a congregation, encourage one another to grow in our stewardship of all that God has entrusted to us.

You will soon receive the proposed budget for 2019. We, the members of First Presbyterian Church, will vote on this budget at our annual congregational meeting in December. This budget will display the financial perspective of what it will take to do the ministries that the elders believe we are called to carry out in the coming year. Please be in prayer, asking the Lord to work in all of our hearts that we would give generously and cheerfully to the ministries of His church. Keep in mind that the budget is just one aspect of our stewardship. We need not only be godly stewards of our money but we also need to wisely, faithfully, and joyfully steward our time and talents as well, serving in our church, our community, and in the world to the glory of His name. Please join me in praying for the Lord to give us the grace to be Christlike stewards of all His many blessings.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

September 2018 Session Highlights

The elders of First Presbyterian Church meet monthly on the fourth Tuesday. The following are some highlights from the September 25 meeting.

- The Session and Diaconate have both been reading and discussing the book, *The Hole in Our Holiness*, by Kevin DeYoung, at their monthly meetings in 2018. This month we read and discussed Chapter 8, "Saints and Sexual Immorality" In this chapter, DeYoung discusses the reality of sexual sin and the struggles Christians face as we seek to put our own lust to death and pursue purity and holiness. This is particularly difficult in a world where sensuality, eroticism, and sex are readily available to us all in seemingly anonymous, private, and harmless forms on our various media platforms. Particular attention was given to 1 Corinthians 6:12-20.
- •The Session heard a presentation from members of Florida Presbytery's Church Extension Committee encouraging FPC to prayerfully consider intentionally planting a church in the next 3-5 years.
- A recommendation from the Personnel
 Committee to add a new staff position,
 currently titled Director of Church
 Communications and Children's Ministry,
 was approved pending congregational
 approval of the budget in
 December. A committee will be formed to flesh out
 the qualifications and duties that will be required.
 Information about this potential new position will be
 presented to the congregation in the days ahead.
- Stewardship and Finance reported that as of the end of August tithes and offerings toward the church's general budget are at 62.64% of the annual budget. This is ahead of the average of 56.69% (2013-2017) our church has historically received by the end of August. Praise was given to God in prayer for His financial blessing.

Please be in prayer about this.

- •The Session reviewed the list of potential candidates for the offices of deacon and elder. These candidates will participate in a six hour officer training program as a prerequisite for potential nomination to serve the Church as an officer. Please keep these candidates and the nominations process in your prayers.
- The chairmen of the committees of the Session gave reports of the work and ministry they are overseeing (see the ministry sections of the Diligent for more on these ministries). Prayer was offered after each report, asking for the Lord's guidance and blessing.
- •A season of prayer was had for various needs within our congregation, community, and world.

LOVE: NOT VOLUNTEERISM

From Pastor Mackay

This is the final month of exploring our four objectives for Adult Small Groups: Teaching, Fellowship, Outreach, and Service.

"And let us now grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up." -Gal. 6:9

How does, "I believe in Jesus," translate to, "I'm sitting here keeping the nursery and covered in mushy Goldfish crumbs?" Are the two related? Let's make a few connections.

A foundational element of faith in God ("I believe..."), is trust in God. Beyond affirming His existence, the essence of Christianity is that we place our greatest hopes for ourselves and our families in line with His plan of salvation for us. We admit that none of our sin-laden ambitions are worth the judgment that comes in rejecting God's gracious invitation to surrender to the authority of Jesus.

One of the primary ways that trust is expressed is allegiance. Jesus explains that our trust in God is expressed in our allegiance to Him. Seek first the Kingdom of God, Jesus says; before we are loyal to career, to friends, even to family, we are to run with all our might after God in Christ.

And what does that running look like? At the very least, it looks like obedience to God's directives. To complete the chain from belief to truth to allegiance to obedience, we find the command of God: love one another. In his letter to the Galatians, Paul explains what it means to do that. It involves bearing each other's burdens. Jesus is the chief and greatest burder-bearer; on our behalf. This is how he has loved us. And now, with the freedom he has purchased, we are called to serve, to love, and to give to each other.

See the connection? Our belief implies a life of service to others; the drool kids in the nursery included. The church can seem like a never-ending stream of requests to do

something. Whether it's keeping a program going, teaching children, bringing food, or any number of tasks; we all know what it means to be asked to volunteer.

Yet, given that our service is rooted in God's love for us and our response of faith, I'm not sure I like that word, "volunteer." The word implies that the option to work is completely open to the individual. They can jump in (and in the process be lauded for sacrificing their time for a higher calling), or they cannot. This is not the picture that Jesus paints of His people. Our freedom in Christ is also called slavery to righteousness (Romans 6:18), indicating that our allegiance to God, and its subsequent service to the saints is not optional. It is the condition into which the price of Jesus' blood has bought us.

So, would you think of that next time you are asked to help? You are not a volunteer in the church, you are a servant. First and foremost, you are a servant to God in Jesus. Then, by God's logic, you are also a servant to all those others God has called to be His people.

It is my prayer that our Small Groups would be a training ground for such radical service to one another. I am so encouraged by all the stories I hear of exactly this sort of love, but until Jesus returns, there will always be effects of sin to be countered, hurting people to be comforted, and worthy ministries to be undertaken.





IGLESIA EN MOVIMIENTO

Dear friends,

We are so grateful for your prayers and interest in "Iglesia en Movimiento". In a season of fruitful busyness at First Presbyterian Church of Lake Placid, we were still able to complete all of the requirements of the church plant 'exploratory year' for our denomination. God was very merciful and generous, bringing some amazing people to help us during an overwhelming year of ministry. Some highlights of our exploratory year would be: (1) after the hurricane we were able to provide relief to 200 Hispanic families in September and October, (2) we send one 16 wheeler trailer full of relief resources to Puerto Rico. (3) By the Grace of God, we were also able to develop a core group of 15 individuals. These families have caught the vision of Iglesia en Movimiento to such a level that we now have (4) five families who have joined the 'mission role' awaiting membership with IEM. (5) At First Presbyterian Church of Lake Placid, we were also stared providing Spanish translation in our 11am am contemporary service. (6) In January we also hosted a large outreach in the neighborhood of Highland Cove Apartments for the "Three Kings' holiday. We had 250 people in attendance. (7) Finally, be began church plant training with our core group by



attending a Latino church planting conference in Orlando.

During the exploratory year, the Genesis
Center at Lake Placid ARP hosted 4 quinceaneras
(a biblically based 'sweet 16 party') with over 300
people in attendance at each event. These events
allowed pastor Tim to officiate the ceremonies and
develop relationships with various people in the
Latino community.

Currently, we have seven families involved with small groups on Wednesday night. Please keep praying! God is moving here in Lake Placid, Florida. The interest level in 'Iglesia En Movimiento' is high and we have a growing relationship with the Latino community. With Tim being full-time as a church planter this year we are praying for God to move in powerful ways. We cherish your prayers and support. Please see the prayer list for specific ways to pray for the church plant. Most of all please pray for three specific things this quarter: (1) Pray we can start two more small groups in the community. (2) Pray, we can recruit 100 people on our prayer team, and (3) pray we can develop 30 financial partners in the next few months. Thank you again for your support of <u>Iglesia en Movimiento</u>. MEANINGLESSNESS OF MEANINGLESSNESSES

This quarter, the Middle Schoolers and High Schoolers have been going through the book of Ecclesiastes, the most chipper book of the Bible. In this book, the author takes a good, hard look at life and attempts to find out if there is any ultimate meaning for anyone living under the sun. While we have gone through at least two chapters of the book already, I do not have enough room to summarize that much content in one article. That being the case, I would like to introduce you to the first eleven verses, verses which sum up the entire book of Ecclesiastes.

Ecclesiastes begins in verse one by introducing the 'Teacher'. The Hebrew word that is translated as 'Teacher' carries along with it the idea of someone teaching in front of a large assembly. We should think, with so many people gathering to listen to this person, that this guy has something to say. Not only does he attract a crowd with his knowledge, he has incredible credentials as well. This Teacher is the son of David, the King of Jerusalem. These characteristics point us to King Solomon, who, next to Jesus Christ, was known as the wisest man in the history of the world. The Scriptures tell us that people from around the world traveled just to sit at the feet of Solomon to hear from his wisdom. With all of this being said, we should probably listen to what this King has to say.

From the introduction, we know that the author of this book is a wise man, but what is his message? "Meaningless! Meaningless!" says the Teacher in verse two. "Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless." Literally, in Hebrew, what the the author states about life is: "Meaninglessness of meaninglessnesses." Oftentimes, when we are praising someone for something, we say they are "the best of the best". In other words, they are greater than the greatest. When Solomon presents to us the worthlessness and pointlessness of life, he says that out of all of the pointless things that can be

known, life is the most pointless, the most worthless- there is nothing more useless than human existence.

In verses two and three, Solomon states that yes, people live their lives, work hard, and try to make a difference, but in the end they fail. One generation comes. They might say: "We're the ones! We're finally going to change things! We're finally going to right all of the wrongs!" That generation dies and leaves the world unchanged for another generation to come up and pick up where they left off. The world is just one big revolving door.

To illustrate how stuck the human race is in the pointless rat-race of life, in verses five through seven Solomon compares life to the sun, the wind, and the rivers. The sun goes up, the sun goes down. The calendar day might have changed, but the sun still does the same thing that it always does. Life is on a repetitive cycle. The same thing goes for the wind. It blows around in pointless circles and then returns to the same "circuit" it has always been stuck in. The rivers pour themselves into the sea, but for what? It ultimately never fills the ocean- all that work for nothing. The ocean and seas, in the end, are never satisfied.

Through all of these word pictures, Solomon is pointing to the pointless, repetitive nature of our lives. From the outside, it might seem like things have changed but they really haven't. We are always stuck in the same old rut. We give our lives to certain things and people, but we are never ultimately satisfied by them. Life is a treadmill in which we do a lot of running but get nowhere in the end. Solomon ends this section in verses ten through eleven by stating the fact that try as we might, we cannot change the fact that life is pointlessly repetitive.

If you've got up to this point, you might be wondering, "Where is Solomon going with this? This doesn't sound like something I've read in the Bible." Even if it's something you've never read in the Scriptures, though, isn't this something you might have felt before? I remember being a middle schooler and looking for meaning and happiness through having a girlfriend or finding acceptance with my peers.



In the end, I felt like Solomon. None of these things made me happy. I was left frustrated and confused. You don't need to be a middle schooler or high schooler to have this experience though. While we might not like to articulate it in the same way that Ecclesiastes does, if we're honest, we realize that what Solomon is doing is telling us some hard truths.

The reason we can never find satisfaction, the reason we feel like we can never get a break in life, the reason we feel like we can never reach ultimate meaning is because we are banking on this life and the things of this life to do something it was never meant to do, which is give us eternal joy. St.

Augustine, in his autobiography, prayed to Jesus and said, "I was restless until I found rest in you." Until we look to Jesus, His life, death, and resurrection, and how His work reconciles us to the God who can satisfy us forever, we will continue to reflect on life in a way that resonates with the depressing words of Solomon: "Meaninglessness of Meaninglessnesses."
