
From Pastor Chad

We last worshiped together in person on Sunday, March 8. Since then, we have worshiped at home by video recordings of the service (on our website, on YouTube, or DVD). This virtual means of worshiping, and specifically listening to the sermon, has garnered various reactions from many of you, the members of FPC. Some of you have commented that you have appreciated the close-up perspective of Pastor Mackay and me when we have preached. You have mentioned that this perspective and being in your homes while watching has helped you to concentrate more on the sermon and to glean more from the preaching of God's Word. Conversely, others of you have said something that is guite the opposite. You have mentioned that trying to listen to the sermon in your homes, with the preacher on a screen rather than in person, has been very distracting and made it more difficult to follow the message.

Hearing such comments has led me to think a little more deeply about the importance of preaching for the life of the church, especially as we look to begin gathering publicly again in the days ahead, while also still providing virtual means for viewing the service. As a preacher, I have a great responsibility to prayerfully study the Scriptures and then faithfully communicate the Gospel from them to you, the people of FPC. That said, I am not the only one who bears responsibility for the sermon to be as effective as possible each Sunday. The other people who share responsibility with me are you the listeners! I need to work at preaching well. Likewise, you need to work at listening well.

apply the principle he proposes. One of the things that stood out to me in reading Listen Up! was that Ash makes it clear that good sermon listening is to be a community activity of the church, not just an individual's duty. That is certainly something we have strived for in the past here at FPC through things like the sermon summary and small group discussion guide. We will continue to pursue ways to promote a love for and attentiveness to the preaching of the Word in the days to come.

Hopefully, you will take the opportunity to get a copy of *Listen Up!* and read it soon. I believe this book can help us grow stronger in sermon listening, and, by better sermon listening, grow stronger in our faith in Christ. SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

May 2020 Session Highlights

The elders of First Presbyterian Church meet on the fourth Tuesday of each month. The following notes are some highlights from their meeting on May 26.

- The Session considered Revelation 5:1-14 for a devotional before the meeting. The theme was the good news that Jesus is the one who is worthy to open the scroll of the judgment and the redemption of world.
- The Session discussed its ongoing shepherding ministry to the people of FPC, sharing news from recent contacts that were made with numerous members as we seek to stay in touch with the people of FPC during the coronavirus restrictions. Prayer was offered on behalf of those members.
- Stewardship & Finance reported that as of the end of April 2020, tithes and offerings toward the church's 2020 general budget are at \$335,825, which is 35% of the 2020 budget. This is above the average of 31% (2015-2019) our church has historically received by the end of March. Our expenses were \$288,162, 30% of the budget, for a net gain of \$47,663. Praise was given to God in prayer for his financial blessing.
- The Session approved recommendation by the staff that we enter into a first phase of gathering for public worship and other ministries beginning Sunday, June 7. Detailed information has been

distributed to the congregation through email, the church website, and postal service mail.

SEEKING WISDOM

From Pastor Mackay

I told myself that I wouldn't write a pandemicthemed article this month but, here we are. In God's providence, we are met with another challenge brought to us through the coronavirus: the challenge of regathering. The Session has worked hard to institute guidelines for coming together in worship, may they be followed with joy (Heb. 13:17). Yet, there remains the decision each of us must make. Do I return to worship or "normal" Christian life is regular church attendance.


We are called to obey our government leaders.

But now, we have a problematic circumstance. Are Christians *ever* allowed to miss worship? Certainly the answer is yes. But, let's think through why, in this case. First, we must consider our government. God institutes government, and, as it accomplishes good things like restraining evil and stabilizing society,

not? As we pray for wisdom (James 1:5), let's do our best to think through the matter biblically.

We are called to obey God.

Obedience to God's commands is always better than disobedience (see Psalm 1). It brings blessings, both in this life and all eternity (Mark 10:29-30). Obedience is an essential outworking of faith: trusting God above all others. The chief end of man is to glorify God and to



enjoy him forever. So what does obedience look like?

We are called to worship together.

God commands us not to neglect the gathering

thus permitted for everyone. Let us give thanks for this.

Our government is also providing *guidance* for everyone gathering in groups. We are following this guidance, not only because we are to obey our government, but because we are called to preserve life.

it is to be obeyed (Rom 13:1, 1 Pet 2:13-14). It's worth pointing out here that the contemporary governments of the New Testament writers were hardly sympathetic to Christians! Yet, they recognized that even a horrible government is better than none at all. Thankfully, in Florida, we do not have a government that is antithetical to church gatherings. Worship has been rightly deemed "essential" from day one, and

of his people (Heb 10:24-25) because the corporate life of God's people is inherent to our identity and purpose. The local church is where the Word is taught and preached (2 Tim 3:16-4:2), where the sacraments are practiced (1 Cor. 11), and the primary place for discipleship and evangelism. (Acts 14:23; 16:5; Matt. 28). To neglect corporate gathering as a "free agent" Christian is to misunderstand the nature of our covenant relationship with God and with other believers. So, the weight of evidence is clearly that we are to worship whenever possible. The

We are called to protect ourselves and others. God is the creator and lord of life (Gen 1:30, 2:7; Acts 3:15). Thus, mankind is forbidden from taking life without God's authorization (e.g., in the case of capital punishment or just war) (Exod. 20:13). We normally think of this command with respect to others, yet we are also

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forbidden to take our own lives into our hands. We are not our own. We belong, body and soul, to God. (1 Cor. 6:19-20) All in all, God's command against murder, and his concern for the protection of life mean that we should be guided by a doctrine of *carefulness*. We should not be foolish with our lives or the lives of others. We particularly are to be concerned about the weak and helpless (Ps 72:12-14).

During the coronavirus, the prevailing wisdom among Christians in Florida has been a temporary suspension of worship. Why? Precisely because we are called to preserve life. The trickiest part of all this has been balancing these two commands. Worship is important, so is protecting life. The devastation many predicted led to the wise choice to take advantage of technology and, instead of worshipping together, watching worship elements in our homes. This is not the same as coming together, and we need to be careful about our language in the days ahead. "I worshipped at home," may be true, but watching a church service is not answering the high calling we all have to worship together. So, no one can "go to church" at home.

Now that our government leaders are reopening, and we have the unchanged command to gather, we are restarting worship. But, wait! Isn't there still risk? Yes!

Yet, we see in the Bible that protecting ourselves is not our highest end. Paul accepts danger in his service to others (1 Cor. 4:7-18) and sees his earthly life from the right perspective (Phlp 1:20-24). Our service to God is to be characterized by zeal and eagerness, not hesitancy and self-protection. Our greatest example, Jesus, was characterized by the love of self-sacrifice (John 15:13, Phlp 2:5-7). We are to reflect that (Rom 12:1). So, we must entrust ourselves ultimately to God and not our own protection. We must care for ourselves in order to care for those who need us, but we must not forget that it is ultimately God who is caring for them through us. We are to entrust their wellbeing to Him, as well as our own.

Can that happen without attending church? Yes, but our momentum should be to that end. As you pray through your own situation, remember to place your hope in one who is our refuge and strength. (Ps 46:1) We do not know what each day will bring, but God does (Isaiah 46:8-10). God holds every one of our days in his hands, and coronavirus or not, he is working them to his purposes in his timing. Attending church is no guarantee that God will not allow coronavirus to enter our midst, but If our hope is in him, and we yearn for his glory by grace, we know that our eternal future is secured.

THOUGHTS ON A FAVORITE HYMN

One of my favorite hymns is *Children of the Heavenly Father*, hymn 131 in the Trinity Hymnal. It was written by Caroline V. Sandell Berg (1832 -1903), who was Swedish and penned more than 600 hymns. It is usually set to a traditional Swedish melody, by the same Swedish name, *Tryggare Kan Ingen Vara*. I love the imagery in this hymn text and the close connection to biblical truths found in every verse.

Verse one shares two important biblical truths: "Children of the Heavenly Father safely in his bosom gather, Nestling bird nor star in heaven such a refuge e'er was given." If we are believers in the Lord Jesus Christ, we are, in fact, children of the Heavenly Father! "But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God" (John 1:12). What a wonderful promise! We are also told in John 10:28-29 that we are completely safe in God's hands: "I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and no one is able to snatch them out of the Father's hand." I find great comfort in the fact that I am completely, one-hundredpercent safe in my Lord's hands!

Verse two assures us that God's care extends to our everyday life as we follow God's laws: "God his own doth tend and nourish, in his holy courts they flourish;

From all evil things he spares them, in his mighty arms he bears them."

rulers, nor things present nor things to come, powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything Else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Verse four talks about God being with us at all times, and coming to our defense whenever we need him: "Praise the Lord in joyful numbers, your Protector never slumbers; At the will of your Defender every foe-man must surrender." Psalm 121 reminds us that "our help comes from the Lord who made heaven and earth," and "he who keeps you will not slumber...behold he who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep." God is also the ultimate, all-powerful defender! "The LORD is your keeper; the LORD is your shade on your right hand. The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night. The LORD will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life. The LORD will keep your going out and your coming in from this time forth and forevermore." Hallelujah! What a Savior!

Verse five speaks of God's love, even in times of trouble: "Though he giveth or he taketh, God his children ne'erforsaketh; His the loving purpose solely to preserve them pure and holy." Romans 8:28 reminds us that "we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose." This is a great comfort, especially when we don't understand why things are happening the way they are. We can know that they have a holy purpose and rest in God's love for us. We also know that at times God chastens us because he loves us: "For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives. It is for your discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons" (Hebrews 12:8-9).

Verse six wraps up this hymn with the assurance of our security in the hands of our all-powerful, allknowing, and loving God: "More secure is no one ever than the loved ones of the Savior: Not von star on high abiding nor the bird in home-nest hiding." Matthew 10:29-31 states this beautifully recounting the words of Jesus Christ as he taught his disciples: "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? And not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. But even the hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not, therefore; you are of more value than many sparrows." My prayer for you is that you know the joy, peace, and comfort of the Lord, and you feel completely safe in his arms. There is no situation, including a worldwide pandemic that is beyond our Lord's control, and HE will be our Heavenly Father, Guide, Protector, and Keeper for eternity! Praise the Lord!

Proverbs two gives encouragement to follow God's Law because in doing so, we will find knowledge, understanding, wisdom, discretion, and paths of righteousness! We will also find ways to forsake paths of darkness and avoid those whose paths are crooked.

Verse three speaks about our eternal security: "Neither life nor death shall ever from the Lord his children sever;

Unto them his grace he showeth, and their sorrows all he knoweth."

Romans 8:38-39 brings this verse to life: "For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor

"Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." -James 1:2-4

FAITHFULNESS RESTORES EQUILIBRIUM

Equilibrium. I like it. When I have a routine, know what to expect, get work done on time, and feel the progress of the days, weeks, and months in line with a sense of the seasons and the smell of the air, I feel equilibrium. Two weeks ago, I recently returned from a few days away on a Thursday, went to work on a Friday to do work I used to do on Monday, worked on worship resources for Sunday on Saturday, worshiped with my family at home on Sunday, and went back to work on Monday, which was Memorial day, a day off; I had forgotten it was a holiday. No equilibrium.

It has been 12 weeks since I have felt like I knew what to do, when to do it, and what to expect next. I am not usually an anxious person, but I feel mildly anxious these days. I confess that I struggle to maintain a constant composure of trust and faithfulness, no matter how hard I try. "My flesh and my heart fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever" (Psalm 73:26). Praise God for his gift of the Holy Spirit to encourage, comfort, and guide my weak heart back to himself!

As Christians amid the constant shifting sands of the current issues, all of us are bound to fail in our faithfulness in trusting God at some point. It is inherent to our human nature, but praise God that he has provided us a way back to himself. His Word remains constant, and in it, we find the assurances that edify us and set us back upon the solid ground of his truth. God did not promise us a life of order and calm, but he said to "take heart" because he has overcome it all. "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). Long ago, Jesus overcame this world that is bursting with illness, racial tension, political discord, and even neighbors with different opinions than mine.

As a believer in Jesus Christ, my purpose is to trust in what God has already done and show the evidence of the Spirit of God in me that comes through faith in Jesus Christ: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23).

So, while I may lose my balance (more often than I care to admit), God is never thrown off balance. He holds the right balance, the equilibrium of the universe, in his hands. We know this promise to be true, "Nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight. Everything is uncovered and laid bare before the eyes of him to whom we must give account. Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has ascended into heaven, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess" (Hebrews 4:13-14).


