ANSWERS AND PROMISES

From Pastor Mackay

In the last week, I received the sad news that a college friend and former colleague in youth ministry passed away at the young age of 36 from a rare autoimmune disease. He leaves behind a wife and young children; a great tragedy.

I tuned in to the livestream of the memorial service and heard the minister (who happens to be closely related to the deceased) deliver a message that has had my heart and mind buzzing. Providentially, it relates to some aspects of our advent series

(especially our message on Sarah), and thus I hope to encourage us all with Biblical truth.

If there is one question that we want to ask God more than any other, it is, "Why?" It takes many forms. Why has such a tragedy taken place in the life of a friend? Why have I enjoyed blessing and health when my friend/ spouse/family member has struggled with pain/depression/ sadness? Why is there

a pandemic, and why is the pandemic such a divide issue in our society? Why have my diligent efforts in school/work/family fallen flat?

TXSIf we aren't asking "why" ourselves, we are close to someone who is. The "why" question is a direct entry into what we call the doctrine of God's providence. The Westminster Larger Catechism defines it in question and answer 18: "God's works of providence are his most holy, wise, and powerful preserving, and governing all his creatures; ordering them, and all their actions, to his own glory." The key concept is that word, "all." There is nothing that happens outside of the control of God. But, what are his purposes in them? Here are two thoughts to keep in mind when engaging the big questions of "Why."

God's secret will is unknown to us. The minister at my friend's memorial service began with an excellent point. He said that some tend to present Christianity as a package of answers to every question. However, the "why" questions defy such a pithy statement, and in fact, render such an approach a dishonor to God himself. God's Word makes clear that God has *not* revealed every detail of his plans for us. In Isaiah 55:8 we read, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, declares the Lord."

Considering our recent sermon, why did Sarah have to endure 25 years of barrenness and

struggle before the birth of Isaac? We can give broad answers. Struggles test us and build steadfastness in our faith (James 1:2-3). In the best, most loving sense of the word, God disciplines us for our good (Heb. 12:7-11). But even with that in mind, our hearts yearn for more. Our "why's" may turn to "how's." "How is this helping me love Jesus more?," we might ask. "It certainly doesn't seem to be at this moment!"



Ultimately, in the case of

Sarah, we simply don't know all that God is up to. Similarly, in our own lives, our calling is not know everything that God is up to. (It certainly isn't to talk to others like we know everything God is up to.) Our calling is to humble ourselves to his providence.

God's revealed will is glorious. Here's where it all comes together. For one, we have no right to question God. Read Romans 9:20, what right does clay have to question its maker? Yet, we have a further reason that is beyond all we can ask or imagine: consider what God has done in his providential sovereignty over all things.

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Consider what we celebrate this time of year, that God has come near to us. He has not stayed far off from our pain, but taken on flesh and dwelt among us. Consider the worst thing that has ever happened on earth: the perfect Son of God dying the death of a sinner! That act God, in his providence, has taken and made the very mechanism of our salvation. We do not know all that God is up to, but if it is this God who is in charge (which it is!), our calling is to seek him, to humble ourselves, and to rejoice in this glorious act of salvation in Jesus Christ. We are to act in accordance with what we know, and what a glorious plan that has been revealed to us!

So, while we may not have all the answers, we have God's promises. God has promised us that he is working all things for his glory, which is synonymous with saying he is working all things for his good. Because of Jesus, we know God's promises are true. Is God not worthy of our trust? Is he not one in whom we should place utter faith? Is he not the glorious, good God of our salvation? Let us trust him, for he loves us.

I will conclude with a wonderful quote used in the memorial service for my friend. Sarah Edwards was the wife of Jonathan Edwards, a minister, first president of Princeton University, and considered by many to be the greatest intellectual mind the United States has ever produced. Rev. Edwards died of an overdose of smallpox vaccine when he was 55 years old. These are the words Sarah wrote to their daughter upon his death.

My Very Dear Child,

What shall I say? A holy and good God has covered us with a dark cloud. Oh that we may kiss the rod, and lay our hands on our mouths.

The Lord has done it. He has made me adore His goodness, that we had him so long. But my God lives; and He has my heart.

O what a legacy my husband, and your father, has left us! We are all given to God; and there I am, and love to be.



SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The elders of First Presbyterian Church meet monthly on the fourth Tuesday. The following are highlights from the meeting on November 16.

- Potential officer candidates were interviewed by elder teams, and the nomination slate was approved. (See slate below in Congregational Meeting announcement)
- Prayer was given for our the needs of our congregation and the ministries of our church.
- The Pastor Search Committee chair, David Nelson, reported that after a brief pause they have continued their efforts
- Nominations Committee update: officer training for potential elder and deacon candidates took place on October 16, 2021. The potential candidates will be interviewed by active elders prior to the next session meeting, with the goal of approving a final slate at the November meeting.
- The 2022 church budget was approved for a congregational vote, and the annual congregational business meeting was called for December 12 after worship.
- Stewardship and Finance reported that annual giving remains ahead of the YTD average. For the last five years, average giving through October has been 71.47%. This year it is at 77.71%
- Bea Meeker was approved for the position of Nursery Coordinator.
- Evangelism and Outreach is organizing a community outreach event during the Lake Wales Christmas parade on Saturday, December 11th.
- Bonuses were approved for full-time, salaried staff.

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Music Ministry

O COME, O COME, EMMANUEL VENI EMMANUEL

One of the things I love about congregational songs that are ancient is realizing millions of saints have sung the very song we are singing! The fact that the hymns and tunes have stood the test of time is verification of how they have been valued through the ages. One of my favorite hymns and tunes that is usually associated with Advent and Christmas is O Come, O Come, Emmanuel to the tune entitled, Veni Emmanuel. The Latin text is a compilation of several O Antiphons (an Antiphon is simply a choral song, sometimes sung after a Psalm) that originated as far back as the 9th century and were put into hymn form in the 12th century. The text first appeared as a hymn in the 18th century in the collection entitled, Psalteriolum Cantionum Catholicarum (1710).

There are many "versions" of this hymn, but the most common has seven verses which are below:

O come, O come Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that morns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear.

Refrain:
Rejoice! Rejoice!
Emmanuel
Shall come to thee, O
Israel

O come, Thou Wisdom, from on high, and order all things far and nigh; to us the path of knowledge show, and teach us in her ways to go. Refrain

O come, O come, Thou Lord of might, who to thy tribes on Sinai's height in ancient times did give the law,

in cloud, and majesty, and awe. Refrain

O come, Thou Rod of Jesse's stem, from ev'ry foe deliver them that trust Thy mighty power to save, and give them vict'ry o'er the grave. Refrain

O come, Thou Key of David, come, and open wide our heav'nly home, make safe the way that leads on high, that we no more have cause to sigh. Refrain

O come, Thou Dayspring from on high, and cheer us by thy drawing nigh; disperse the gloomy clouds of night and death's dark shadow put to flight. Refrain

O come, Desire of the nations, bind in one the hearts of all mankind; bid every strife and quarrel cease and fill the world with heaven's peace. Refrain



The tune that is associated with this hymn is also called Veni Emmanuel and is plainsong from the 13th century. Plainsong is melody without any meter or harmonization, and was intended to be sung freely, with the text serving as the sole controller of emphasis indicated by the lengthening of important words. The versions of the tune that are well-known today have been "versified" and "harmonized" to accommodate congregational singing. You might find it interesting to

trying singing this hymn a cappella while giving important words more time to discover what it would have been like to have sung it in the 12th century.

Finally, as saints on the "other side" of Christ the Messiah's coming, we now look for another "coming" of Christ, as he finally comes to take his children to be with him forever! Hallelujah! What a Savior!


