### "THE CHOSEN" AND PEOPLE OF THE BOOK

### From Pastor Mackay

A visual age is a challenge for a people of the Book. Christians are to be devoted to the inspired, inerrant Word of God (2 Tim 3:16-17) as our one rule of faith and practice. Yet, we live in a world where some of our most influential stories are told through visual media (movies, television, etc.). It is a natural impulse, then, that Christians in recent years have used all kinds of visual media to retell the story of the Bible.

You've probably heard about (and probably seen) *The Chosen*, a live-action, episodic account of Jesus' earthly ministry produced by Angel Studios. I've had a few of you ask me about *The Chosen*, and I am always helped by getting my thoughts out in written form, so let me share a few thoughts with you. My thesis is: While we shouldn't fear *The Chosen*, it carries a particular danger of supplanting the Bible in our minds as the one and only true way that we know Jesus.

Two personal admissions: First, I haven't seen *The Chosen*, and I don't really intend to watch it. I've seen a clip or two, so I get the style and appreciate the artistry involved, but I haven't seen the whole thing. You can throw this article away right now if you'd like, but you need to know that my thoughts below are *why* I haven't watched it and don't feel the need to.

Secondly, I appreciate visual mediums of art, and I think Christians should use them to tell good, redemptive stories. Maybe it's because I'm a child of the 80's or because there are many hours of VHS footage at my parents house filmed by a young Mackay, but I like a well-made movie. You can ask Rachel, who kindly endured a recent documentary we watched about Industrial Light and Magic, the special effects company founded by George Lucas as he made the original *Star Wars* film. Visual storytelling is a valid form of art. It can be helpful to believers and God-honoring.

Finally, I think that faithful retellings of the story of the Bible is a good way to teach the Bible to (especially) our children and ourselves. I love *The Jesus Storybook Bible*, *The Biggest Story*, and other such works. Now: the authors of these works will tell you that they must never take the

place of the Bible. However, they are helpful aids. A related note: in such media I believe pictures of Jesus can be fine. I'll fine-tune this a bit below, but at the outset I don't think a visual depiction of Jesus is necessarily problematic.

So, it seems like I've made a great case for everyone to watch *The Chosen* so far. Why am I cautious about it? It comes down to the realism of *The Chosen* as it handles its subject, and the role the Bible should play in our lives. As we began, we want *only* the Bible to shape our hearts, minds, and consciences. *The Chosen* endangers that desire. I think there are two Biblical concepts to take into account here.

Chiefly, we are confronted with a matter of the second commandment (Exodus 20:4). God commands that images are not to be worshipped. God chose, at Sinai, to reveal himself through word, not image (Deut 4:12), thus to make an image representing him (like the Israelites tried to do with the Golden Calf), is a heinous sin. In the New Testament, God revealed himself visibly in Jesus Christ (John 14:9), but Jesus is now reigning in Heaven. Thus, just as the Israelites were not to worship images of the invisible God, so Christians should not worship images of the Jesus we do not now see. We are to worship Jesus, not pictures of Jesus.

Now, here's the rub that Christians have been dealing with forever: where's the line between using a picture of Jesus to teach about Jesus and worshipping a picture of Jesus? I doubt anyone who watches The Chosen would ever claim to be worshipping the visual depiction of Jesus therein. But, discretion and honesty have to come into play. Is devotion to The Chosen increasing or decreasing our devotion to the Bible? (Who hasn't said, "Why read the book when I can see the movie?") Are you more excited to have people watch a show or more excited to go to the Word with them? When you think about Jesus: do you find your thoughts shaped by God's holy Word, or by a television series? This is why I speak of the realism of The Chosen being a problem. Gritty, realistic visuals are so very powerful! They connect quickly to our hearts, minds, and emotions. So, we must be careful with them all the more.

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By the way, this plays into my counsel on pictures of Jesus overall. Drawings of Jesus, such as in *The Jesus Storybook Bible*, communicate that Jesus was a real person but do less to form our consciences regarding what that real person was actually like. I think photorealistic depictions of Jesus are more problematic.

The second issue we deal with is what we call the sufficiency of Scripture. God's word makes very plain that God's testimony in his Son is the final word on himself and salvation (Hebrews 1:1-4). We are not to expect any further revelation (words directly from God to people) until Jesus returns. God has given us what we need in the Bible!

All the excitement, then, about *The Chosen* may be founded on something implicit like, "We've found something better than the Bible." Or, at least, "We have a boring Bible; but here's something that will finally liven it up!" All such ideas cast doubt on the Biblical fact that the Bible is enough. I would especially point out that the creator of *The Chosen* is on record as saying, "Get used to different." I have also seen (though, note well, on a trusted pastor's social media and not on a news site) that Jesus says, "I am the Law of Moses," In a future episode.

Are you aware that this is not a quote from the Bible, but is a quote from the Book of Mormon? It seems clear that a faithful, Biblical retelling of the Jesus story is not at top of his list.

What about other good devotionals and Bible commentaries, then? These are good because they are not seeking to add to or amend Scripture, but to explain it. A good commentary is entirely devoted to discovering the meaning of the original text, not to present new material.

Two final thoughts. First, what I'll call the *Veggietales* principle. While retellings of the Bible may be OK, Christians should nevertheless continually build a growing love for and knowledge of the Bible as they mature. If a six year old thinks of vegetables at the mention of David and Goliath, fine. But if the same can be said of a forty year old lifetime church member, then that Christian has some growing to do!

And, I'll conclude with this: *The Chosen* is a fad. Just like so many shows, books, and movies in this throw-away culture; this particular take on the Jesus story will flare and then pass away. It is only God's word that will not pass away. It is only his word that shows us the true Jesus. It is only his word that the Spirit will use to bring sinners to salvation! Let us root ourselves in that word.

### SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The elders of First Presbyterian Church meet monthly on the fourth Tuesday. The following are highlights from the meeting on October 25.

- The Session continued a study of *The Shepherd Leader* by Timothy Witmer. A strategy for forming Shepherding Groups continues to be refined, looking to next year for implementation.
- Needs of the congregation were shared, and a time of prayer was held for the people and ministries of our church.
- The Nominations Committee reported that officer training is continuing Wednesday evenings at 5:15pm. The committee will present a slate of nominees for elder and deacon before the November session meeting. The potential nominees will be interviewed by the elders and the slate of nominees certified during the session meeting.
- Stewardship and Finance reported from their October 11th meeting.
  - As of the end of September, YTD giving was at 66% of the budget against YTD expenses at 60% of the budget. Net year to date is +\$54,237. The Operating Fund balance was \$248,119.
  - The 2023 operating budget, having been approved by diaconate, was voted to be passed on to the congregation for a vote.
  - -Church officers will pledge to the 2023 operating budget on November 6. The congregation will pledge to the budget on November 13 and 20.
- The annual stated congregational meeting was set for December 11 following morning worship. The congregation will vote on the 2023 operating budget and church officers.

### Music Ministry

#### DIETRICH BUXTEHUDE

#### **From Vince Treadway**

Dietrich Buxtehude (c1637-1707) was a German or Danish composer best known for his organ compositions and for his influence on Johann Sebastian Bach. He left a substantial body of sacred vocal music as well, but it is not as well known as his organ music.

He lived in Lubeck, Germany, and served several churches in that town, all of which were known as "Saint Mary's." His compositional style caught Bach's attention because it introduced new ideas for organ music including recitative-like sections, more harmonic freedom, and the pedal solo, as well as a more improvisatory style.

No documents exist which verify Buxtehude's birth date and nationality. The only document contemporary to him was at his death which recognized Denmark as his native country.

His duties in the churches he served included playing the main morning service and the afternoon service on Sundays and feast days, and for Vespers on the preceding afternoon. He was also responsible for preparing other musicians who served in the church. He reinstated the practice of giving afternoon concerts at church, which were called "Abendmusik."

The documentary evidence for J. S. Bach's famous trip to Lubeck to hear Buxtehude rests on the proceedings of the Arnstadt consistory of 21 Feburary, 1706, where it is note that Bach "has been to Lubeck in order to learn one thing or another about his (Buxtehude's) art, and that he had requested a leave of

four weeks but stayed about four times as long." Buxtehude's influence on Bach's organ works is quite evident following Bach's return home, and Bach "took the ball and ran with it" by developing the ideas of Buxtehude and taking them much further in complexity and creativity.

Buxtehude's works include sacred vocal, choral, secular vocal, organ, and instrumental works. Buxtehude's influence on composers such as Bach helped launch a new era of music that led to what is known today as the "Classical" era..
