PSALM 53: **HEARTS OF UNBELIEF**

The fool says in his heart, 'There is no God...' -Psalm 53:1

"What would tell me that something is wrong?" Don't we ask that question all the time? When our doctor sends us test results that are a jumble of numbers, we want to know. When we are leaning over the engine of a car and it's making a noise, that question runs through our mind. We need to know symptoms, so we can pursue a cure.

In Psalm 53, David reflects on the unbeliever. It is worth our time to consider his inspired thoughts in order to keep a close watch on ourselves. Hebrews tells us that Christians, secure in God's hands, can nevertheless think, speak, and even act in ways that echo unbelief. It is unbelief that kept the Israelites from entering the promised land (Heb 3:19). Christains also can impinge our assurance, disguiet our souls, and falter in our witness if we are not diligent in rooting out unbelief.

From Psalm 53, let's consider three symptoms of a heart of unbelief:

1. Saying there is no God

The most fundamental symptom of unbelief is the most fundamental lie: there is no God. Notice that the unbeliever says this "in his heart." Before it leads to attitudes and actions, it is an inner mantra. Unbelief is not passive, but active. Paul notes similarly in Romans 1 that the unbeliever "suppresses the truth" (Rom 1:18). Just as a world class athlete must guide his training with mental determination driving him to success, so a heart of unbelief rehearses that God does not exist.

David notes that "there is none who does good, not even one." (v. 3) This is an important verse on which we hang out doctrine of Total Depravity; that all have sinned. This applies to Christians, as well. If we say we have no sin, we lie (1 John 1:10). Christians enjoy the unspeakable gift of forgiveness from sin and freedom from its ultimate consequences. By

God's grace, Christians have had the truth revealed to them. We are freed from this echo chamber of death. However, we can be tempted to cordon off parts of our lives and act as though they are not under God's purview. When we knowingly sin, there is a small part of us attempting to convince our hearts that God is not real.

Striving against unbelief in this case means Christians should strive to hear God's Word, "Turn to me and be saved, all the ends of the earth! For I am God, and there is no other." (Isa 45:22) Indeed, God is God, and he is not silent.

2. Misinterpreting Reality

Without the touchstone of God, a heart of unbelief does not assess truth correctly. David writes that they are, "in terror where there is no terror!" Similarly, elsewhere in Scripture God condemns false prophets for a message of peace, "where there is no peace" (e.g., Ezek. 13:10).

It is a sobering assessment. On one hand, hearts of unbelief bear the awful weight of their sin without recourse. Their own needs, weakness, and the surety of their death hound them constantly. The law is written on their hearts (Rom 2:15), under which they sense the guilt and shame of sin without relief. On the other hand, in a whiplash with which we are all too familiar, hearts of unbelief also whisper that, because God is not God, actually everything is just fine! We are not condemned.

Christians know to lean not on our own understand, but in all our ways to acknowledge God, and he will make our paths straight. (Prov 3:5-6) In Jesus, God has made peace with us, and has assured that even though his providence may at times be mysterious, no hardship will pry us from his hand. Christians are free both from the fear of death and sin, and can face our neediness with confidence, knowing our loving Father has given us all that we need.

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3. Acting out sin

Out of unbelieving hearts flows wicked words, thoughts, and deeds. David enumerates that hearts of unbelief do wrong (v. 1), they partner in doing wrong (v. 3), and often it is the people of God who bear the brunt of their sin. Unbelievers "eat up [God's] people like bread." (v. 4)

Christians continue to sin, which harms one another. However, we know the truth of God's

victory. As David foresaw, salvation has indeed come from Zion in the person of Jesus Christ.

So, we can boldly root out the echoes of unbelief that show in our hearts and lives. After all, we have *new* hearts by God's grace. Let us then, not be dismayed or discouraged, but strive together to live in the light as he is in the light.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The elders of First Presbyterian Church meet monthly on the fourth Tuesday (usually). The following are highlights from the meeting on August 22.

- Shepherd lists were confirmed by the session, with elders sent out to begin their quarterly contact work.
- A time of prayer was offered to God for many of our congregation.
- Myers McKinney reported on his early work and short term goals. He is beginning a multi-week rotation around the adult small groups to learn our ministries.
- Elder chairmen reported on the work of their various committees.
- An ad hoc committee has completed its work, recommending additional money in the 2024 budget that will be saved for major maintenance reserve.
- Stewardship and Finance reported that as of July 31, budgeted income is at 50% of the annual budget.
 The general operating balance is \$159,760.
- Walker Kirkpatrick reported on three avenues of ministry for middle and high school students in the coming year. Sunday morning Sunday school, Sunday night youth group, and twice weekly youth Bible study.
- Evangelism and Outreach committee reported their support for a pickle ball outreach program.
- The session approved a Fall Kickoff for Sunday, September 10th.

NO GREATER LOVE. NO GREATER FRIEND.

From Pastor Myers

I have called you friends -John 15:15

We are in the midst of a profoundly deep identity crisis.

This is, of course, painfully obvious. I don't have to tell you. All you have to do is to try following current events, politics or culture without getting sucked into so-called "identity politics." You will not get very far. On the one hand, no generation has been more obsessed with identity than our generation (the millennial and Gen Z generations). And yet, ironically, no generation has been more confused about identity, than our generation. We are simultaneously the most identity focused people and yet also the least identity secure people perhaps in history.

This insecurity leads to a pervasive anxiety. That is why the 20th century poet W.H. Auden penned his 1948 Pulitzer prize winning poem The Age of Anxiety, a poem which beautifully captures the angst of modern man as he struggles with a scientific and industrial world which leads to secularism, a secularism which, inevitably, leads to nihilism.

What is nihilism? It is the throwing up of one's hands in despair and declaring that "everything is meaningless!" (Ecclesiastes 1:2) that "nothing really matters" (Freddy Mercury) that life is "a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, but signifying nothing" (Macbeth).

And the sick joke of secularism and the Godless world it leaves us with is that when that nihilism starts to close in, when the emptiness starts to take its toll, all the "solutions" which modern man invents to try to remedy the situation only make his situation worse.

This is also, of course, painfully obvious. I don't

have to tell you. Social media has made us more anti-social. Greater platforms given to more cultural and political viewpoints has made us more polarized. Globalism has made us more tribal and we could go on. Great.

But as anxious as our world seems to be now, as close to despair as we seem to be now, it could be worse. Think of Jesus' disciples as they faced the fact that their master would soon endure a cruel, slow death? Were they anxious? Were they on the verge of despair? Surely their situation must have been at least comparable to ours, if not far worse than ours.

In John's account of this final night, Jesus himself picks up on his disciples' anxiety. He can sense that his disciples are "troubled" (John 14:1, 27), that sorrow has filled their hearts(John

15:6) and that they are filled with the anguish of a mother in labor (John 16:21).

What does Jesus say to his troubled disciples, lonely, soon to be scattered disciples? What he says is simple but important "No longer do I call you servants...but I have called you friends"

There's no need to overthink this. The friendship of Jesus is the only way out of our anxiety and emptiness, not just "out there" in the culture but "in here" in our families and in our own hearts. Why? It is because it is in Him, in Jesus, that we will find every spiritual blessing corresponding to our every spiritual need (Eph 3:1). It is in Christ Jesus that all of God's promises to us find their 'yes' and 'amen' (2 Cor 1:20).

In the midst of a world that is scarce on true friendship, Christ himself is the greatest friend we could ever have. Whereas the foundation of most friendships is shared blood (Prov 18:24), the foundation of the greatest friendship is shed blood(1 Pet 3:18). Jesus sticks closer than any brother or sister; closer than any husband or wife; closer than any father or mother. It is union with Christ by the Spirit which Christ has poured out that we have a friend in our destitution, a hope for our anxiety, and fullness in our emptiness (Eph 3:19). ■





"I CAN'T SING!"

Many people have made the statement to me, "I can't sing!." The translation of this statement can be one of many, but here are a few:

"I was told as a child that I couldn't sing, so therefore I don't"

"I was rejected from the choir as a child and told I should not sing, so I don't"

"I don't like the sound of my voice, and I'm selfconscious about it, so I just keep quiet"

"I have been told that I'm singing the wrong notes, and I can't tell one from another, so I just don't sing"

"My heart is so heavy that I can't summon the emotional energy to sing, so I don't"

"I was told by my spouse that I had a lousy voice, so I don't sing"

The list goes on and on! I am deeply grieved by these statements because they are based on hurts and untruths and are depriving the person of one of the greatest joys on earthsinging praise to God!

One true story that comes to mind is about a lady in one of the churches I served who came up to me and said,

"You said you can help anybody sing, and I have always been told that I shouldn't, but I want to! Can you help me?"

I told her, "Yes! I can help you find your voice and begin to enjoy singing."

She did come to me, and I was able to help her understand that she was trying to sing in a range that was outside of her physical capability; she was actually a tenor!

She said to me, "But I sound like a man! Aren't women supposed to sing high notes?"

I told her that male and female voices differ greatly, and that there are women who can sing very low notes, and men who can sing very high notes, and it does not make them any less of a woman or a man, it is simply the voice that they have. Once she realized that she needed to sing much lower than she had been attempting to, she was indeed able to find the right notes and sing in church with great joy!

I will never forget her coming to me a few weeks later and giving me a big hug and with a great smile saying,

"You helped me to sing! Now I can sing in church! Praise the Lord!"

The truth is, most, if not all, people can sing, and it is not that hard to learn how. I would encourage everyone who has made the statement, "I can't sing," to come to me and let me help you find your voice and enjoy the pleasure of praising God with it in worship and at home! I promise I will not embarrass or ridicule you in any way, as I have helped many find their voices.

If you are unwilling or unable to come to me and get some vocal coaching, be willing to "make a joyful noise to the Lord" and sing for the pleasure of the Lord, if for no one else. If you think about it, the Lord gave you your voice, and He knows what it sounds like, and He still wants to hear you sing His praise!

Sing aloud to God our strength; shout for joy to the God of Jacob! Psalm 81:1

Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing praise.

James 5:13

Sing to God, sing praises to His name; lift up a song to Him who rides through the deserts; his name is the Lord, exult before Him!










Walker presented the victory oar for FPCLW youth triumph over Frostproof ARP at the first annual Cardboard Regatta!


