MAKING THE INVISIBLE VISIBLE

From Pastor Mackay

I've had several conversations lately where it has been observed that ever since the 2020 pandemic, many books have been published about the church. It would appear that the new patterns of life and the convenience of at-home video streaming have tested the American church's understanding of what it means to live out our faith in corporate worship with our brothers and sister. Perhaps a better way to say it is that this "new world" has shown how poorly Christians understand the importance of corporate worship.

In 2 Cor 5, Paul is speaking of the otherworldly hope that Christians hold. We know that we have a home with God in Heaven. While life in the body is not to be despised, it is lived with "groans" as we long for the full redemption that is yet to come.

In other words, we live ultimately based on what we do not see. What we see is our mortality and it's struggles. That can tempt us to build a life singularly devoted to opposing those struggles and maximizing all we can in this world. But, Paul says, we walk *not* by sight, but by faith. We live based on what we do not see.

And, that means we visibly do things because of what is invisible. Isn't it interesting that Paul uses a *visible* metaphor to describe our reaction to an *invisible* reality? It is our walk that is affected: our day to day life. Just like no one can see the wind, but we respond to the wind with the appropriate clothing, so no one can see the hope that we have in Jesus, but we respond to it in visible ways. We make the invisible visible.

I think that's a helpful way to think about living out our faith together in corporate worship. We are expressing an invisible reality by visible discipleship. Consider two big questions:

Who are we? That is, what is this group of people (this church) among whom we live? It is a group that has been forged together by God's amazing, sovereign grace. We who were not a people have been made a people (1 Pet. 2:10). We are God's workmanship (Eph 2:10). This is a

body, even the body of Jesus Christ, which is incomplete without all its parts (1 Cor. 12:12ff). God has given his Holy Spirit that binds us together in unity. (Eph. 4:3)

Notice carefully that this is not something that we ourselves have done! This is God's work. Just as none of us decided the family into which we have been physically born, so God has worked in our hearts to bring forth the new birth of salvation in Jesus Christ. God has knit us together. He has formed his team as he has joined us to him.

What does it mean, then, to make the invisible visible? If we walk by sight, we simply act as a group of people linked by common affinities. Walking by sight creates cliques and tension, as we see differences of opinion rear their heads. More seriously, walking by sight makes church attendance optional at best. Why? Because I see so many better opportunities elsewhere! Yet, the invisible reality is that we belong to one another (Eph. 4:25) by God's grace. Living life together is not creating a reality, it is reflecting the reality that God has created.

Where is God? Now, we know that metaphysically speaking, God is everywhere. Many Christians attempt to use this invisible reality to argue against church attendance. "If God is everywhere, why do I need to be in a building once a week?"

But consider how the Bible talks about God's location. God is "enthroned on the praises of Israel" (Ps. 22:3). His presence is to be understood where his people gather in praise to Him. In the Old Testament tabernacle, Israel was to maintain a constantly burning lamp, and a constantly fresh loaf of bread (Lev. 24:1-9). These were a sign to Israel that the God that filled Heaven and earth dwelt particularly with his people. So, now, God's presence dwells by the Spirit among his people, for the people of God are themselves the new temple (Eph 2:21-22). God is building us together as his dwelling place.

How do we make this invisible reality visible? We gather in worship to experience God's presence.

So, let us walk not by sight, but by faith. Let us make the invisible visible in the way that we order our lives and hearts this year and every year. ■

NEW YEAR RESURRECTIONS (NOT RESOLUTIONS)

If it hasn't happened already, it won't be long until you start to see chinks in the armour of your "new year's resolutions." If you were consistent in getting to the gym in January, chances are that you will not do as well in February. If you have resolved in your heart to keep your cool and not lose your temper, chances are that your patience has been severely tested already.

These and other examples point to one of the basic problems all of us face, and that's the problem of real, genuine, improvement. It is extremely difficult to improve. Our character flaws and vices are like David's enemies, those evil-doers who trample on us all day long and attack us proudly (Ps 56.1-2). As soon as we get out, it's as though they pull us back in.

But the world's way to cultivate improvement, the way of the "new year's resolution", is doomed to fail. Why? Because worldly improvement is always carried out by the wrong means and it is always carried out for the wrong purpose.

When we ask the world how we can enact real, genuine improvement in our lives, the answer ultimately centers on you. It is you who must "be the change you want to see in the world." It is you who must "Just do it." And are you strong enough to overcome you? A biblical, Augustinian heart would confess "no."

And why change? Why try to improve our lives? According to the world, we should improve so that we might have a cushier life, so that we might "move up" in the world, "move up" to a further tax bracket etc. In other words, according to the world, we should improve so that we can store treasure on earth and not in Heaven.

Very different, however, is the Bible's plan for effective, genuine, real improvement. According to the Bible, although we are certainly called to exert effort in our sanctification, the power for such effort ultimately does not originate in us but in God himself. We are to "work harder than any" yes but we are also to recognize and rejoice in the fact that it is "not I, but the grace of God that is with me" (1 Cor 15:9) that explains our growth. We are to work not by our own strength but "by the strength that God supplies."(1 Peter 4:11)

Why? To what end should we strive when we experience real, genuine improvement? Peter finishes his sentence, "in order that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 4:11). In other words, biblical improvement is not about you but God. It's not about earthly treasure but about heavenly treasure.

When we focus more on Christ than on our sins, we will be far more successful in mortifying our sin. When we meditate more on Christ's holiness than on our own lack of holiness, we become more holy. We should consider our sin, yes, but not to the point of morbid introspection but so that we would be led to Christ-o-spection.

With all these considerations in mind, maybe we should think twice before making "new year's resolutions." Of course it is good and right to set goals for ourselves in becoming more like Christ. The act of making a resolution is fine in theory. Jonathan Edwards famously wrote for himself 70 life goals or "resolutions" to follow as well.

But given how often we fail in our resolutions, maybe we should approach our resolutions from a new angle and adopt a new term. I suggest that we opt for a term like "new year's resurrections."

Why? Because fundamentally, if you are a Christian, you are united to Christ in his death and resurrection. All of your sins, all of your flaws, all of your failures have already been set aside in the glorious cancel culture of the Gospel. You are already without blemish in Christ. You are already pure in Christ. You are already holy in Christ. Those are the facts.

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Therefore, in light who you already are, dead with Christ and risen with Christ (Rom 6:4-5), therefore go and live out your identity. In light of Christ's past first fruits resurrection, live into the hope of the future harvest resurrection.

Make your resolutions, sure. Set the imperatives of God's law before you with

utmost seriousness. But do it in light of the great indicatives of the Gospel. Do it in light of your union with the risen and glorified Christ. Let us therefore make our new years' resurrections and walk together by faith in the risen Sun of righteousness this year, trusting that he will bring healing in his wings (Malachi 4:2). ■



THE JOYS AND TRIALS OF MUSIC MINISTRY IN THE CHURCH

THOUGHTS FROM A LIFE OF SERVING THE CHURCH

I began piano lessons when I was 4 years old with the proverbial "little old lady" who was kind and gentle and nurtured my desire to learn to play the piano. I knew even earlier than 4 that I wanted to learn to play the piano, but my parents were told "wait until he's in first grade" and "he's too young to understand." However, my mother persevered and found a teacher for me who got me started on what was to be a lifetime of music and service to the church. When people would ask me as a child, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" I would say, "A church musician!" and they would usually respond with a mild smile and something like, "well that's nice, but I mean what would you really like to do for a living?" I would respond with, "I want to be a church musician!" and they would either smile or just shake their head. As it turned out, my childhood ambition became a reality! When I retire, I will have served the Lord 60 years in the church! I began my "career" when I was 8 years old, because I was hired as the church pianist/ organist at \$5.00 per service (a lot of money for an 8 year old in 1964!) and even as a child faced many of the challenges that I would face later when my service to the church became my full-time career. I praise the Lord who has enabled me to serve Him my entire career in His church! Without God strengthening me, I never would have made it. There were many times that physically or emotionally I did not think I could do it; sometimes I was sick, sometimes I was exhausted, sometimes I was hurt by what people said and did. But the Lord gave me the strength and tenacity to carry on through the good times and the challenging times.

I continued piano lessons with several different teachers from age 4 and through my undergraduate and graduate studies at Indiana University South Bend, then Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond as well as privately with the chair of piano at Temple University. I also studied organ privately as a

young adult, and then formally at Westminster Choir College in Princeton New Jersey during my years there while I worked on my Masters Degrees. While I was going to college I also served in

several churches as Music Director and those jobs included playing the piano and organ and directing choirs and instrumental ensembles. As I served various churches I noticed that children were often completely overlooked in musical training, and only received instruction either privately or at their public or private schools. I had a great burden that children should be trained from an early age to understand, use, and develop their musical gifts to glorify God! So I included the study of teaching children in both my college studies and in my private studies. I attended many choir rehearsals and lectures and seminars on how to lead children, and took careful notes on what was working and what was not working. I developed a great passion and love for teaching children, and it remains one of the parts of my job that I love!

The joys of serving God in music in the church included leading the congregation in rousing praise in song, training and directing children and adults in choirs, helping musicians to develop their skills to use in worship, developing worship plans that helped worshippers to understand and participate in what was happening in worship, and planning and executing special musical programs and concerts. One of my greatest joys was in Philadelphia one year when we were performing Handel's Messiah with full orchestra. Most of the orchestra musicians were from the Philadelphia Orchestra—one of the finest orchestras in the world—and so were very accustomed to playing the Messiah. However, when we got to the chorus "Worthy Is the Lamb That Was Slain" the Holy Spirit filled the room and the singers and the musicians with such power that we could all hardly sing and play through the tears of joy! After the concert was over several of the orchestra members came up to me and said, "What was that that happened in Worthy is the Lamb?! I've never felt anything like that before!"

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I told them, "THAT was the Holy Spirit!"
Seeing choirs of all ages connect to
the music and texts that they sang
has been a wonderful joy as
well, especially when the Holy
Spirit pulled everything
together in a service through
the words of Scripture,
creeds, prayers, and
sermons.

Some of the challenges of music ministry have come from my own lack of experience or planning, and it has simply taken time to develop strategies to plan better to avoid issues. Some of the challenges came from comments from singers, musicians, congregants, and church staff. There have been many Sundays

when after the service people have said, "Where did you dig that hymn up from? That was terrible!" and on the same Sunday, "That was my favorite hymn! Thank you for selecting that hymn for worship!" I once had a pastor say to me, "You just stick to the music and leave everything else to me. If I want your opinion I'll ask for it!" (That did not happen here!) I also remember one Christmas Eve service when I had a fever of 101 and felt absolutely terrible, but I had to carry on because there was no one else to do it!

Like most people, I also had to deal with hurt feelings, misunderstandings, wrongful accusations, and staff issues throughout my career.

I have witnessed the Lord's great blessings on the church as well as the difficult times. But I have never seen the Lord abandon His church when they truly sought after Him! I have seen the Lord provide miraculously many times—when the way seemed absolutely impossible! I have had several people ask me, "Wouldn't you rather do something else for a living? You know you could make a lot more money in the private sector!" My answer has always been the same, "I couldn't do anything else because this is what the Lord has called me to do." There was a time when I thought I would explore the concert world

As I look back over my career in church music I can truly say "the Lord has been so good!" The Lord has led me, blessed me, carried me, forgiven me, and sustained me through His great power, love, and mercy. I would be remiss if I did not also say that the Lord blessed me with a wonderful wife, Faith, who has supported me, urged me, challenged me, and walked through all of the experiences together with me through thick and thin! Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord for all His good gifts, and for the joy of serving Him through a lifetime of music!




